## **Appendix: Sample sizes and margins of error**

The following table shows the unweighted sample sizes and the error attributable to sampling that would be expected at the 95% level of confidence for different groups analyzed in the blog post, "White Protestants and Catholics support Trump, but voters in other U.S. religious groups prefer Harris."

In addition to sampling error, one should bear in mind that question wording and practical difficulties in conducting surveys can introduce error or bias into the findings of opinion polls.
